A unique way to explore the region is via an excursion on the Napa Valley Wine Train. Evoke a bygone era while enjoying a gourmet meal as refurbished Pullman cars chug through the valley. But Napa is not just about wining, dining and relaxing. Visitors also find live music, community theater and charming shops with enticing, handcrafted merchandise.

Napa is a delight for planners, who have at their disposal more than 200,000 sq. ft. of interesting event space, ranging from spacious ballrooms to intimate barrel rooms. The Westin Verasa Napa



Located on the riverbank in the heart of downtown, The Westin Verasa Napa is within walking distance of many restaurants, boutiques and wine-tasting rooms. The sleek, modern resort has 180 guest rooms and 12,000 sq. ft. of meeting space with state-of-the-art audiovisual capabilities.

Guests at the property can enjoy many amenities including a heated saltwater pool and complimentary daily wine tasting. Planners can arrange for an experienced sommelier to conduct a team-building blind tasting exercise where participants can learn how to properly identify key flavor components in different wines.

During their free time, attendees can explore Oxbow Public Market, a popular nearby attraction. The lively market is home to nearly two dozen local vendors selling everything from tacos to ice cream. At Oxbow it is possible to arrange meet and greets with individual purveyors or attend a spice-blending workshop. A short drive away, Cakebread Cellars offers hands-on cooking classes that include a property tour and a three-course lunch with wine pairing. All participants receive a Cakebread Cellars apron and a recipe booklet.
